Dear Members,

I have watched this project grow from the very beginning, often visiting on a daily basis. The sight and sound instantly caused me to pause taking in the power of nature and man together.

I rounded the corner of the Tanabe Welcome Center, and began my walk up the stone pathway with its carefully placed plantings and bamboo fencing crisscrossing the hill. The quiet filled the air as I began my journey.

I crossed the glass bridge and made my way into the floating Umami Café where I enjoyed a cup of tea and a snack. As I savored the different tastes, I looked out the window, saw our blossoming cherry tree bursting with color and it warmed my heart.

What else warms my heart? Imagining all of our visitors over the coming months and years experiencing the Zagunis Castle wall with its traditional stone placement that has been practiced for 15 generations. Watching people stroll through the Tateuchi courtyard being delighted upon seeing the tiny Tsubo-Niwa garden and the Ellie M. Hill Bonsai Terrace.

I can't wait for them to walk into the stunning Jordan Schnitzer Japanese Arts Learning Center for programs in the Yanai classroom, art in the Tanabe gallery, researching in the Vollum library, and enjoying performances in the Cathy Rudd Cultural Corner. On a personal note, I loved watching the first musician playng at the Cathy Rudd Cultural Corner. Yes, I was crying.

What warms my heart especially? The staff who have spent countless hours, days, months, working to make sure every detail was just right. Most of all, it is the commitment from all of you who have taken this journey with us. Not one of us could have made this happen alone.

I thank you for letting me serve as your Board President. And to my successor, the incomparable Dorie Vollum, I wish you all the best as you oversee the legacy of this community treasure. It is, in my opinion, the finest garden in the world outside of Japan.

Letter from Former Garden Director Kinya Hira

In addition to Professor Tono, over the history of the Portland Japanese Garden, nine Garden Directors from Japan have overseen the development and maintenance of the original five gardens in turn, making our Garden unique among Japanese style gardens in North America.

We are grateful to share this beautiful letter from Kinya Hira, who was the first Garden Director for the Garden from 1964-69, sharing his experiences.

JUST A NOTE FROM AN OLD MAN

The Portland Japanese Garden as a Reminder of Peace and Reconciliation.

The Portland Japanese Garden may mean different things to different people. For some visitors, it may be a place to relax and learn about the Japanese culture, or a place of fond memories with a sweetheart. For some directors, the garden may be like their precious child who they cared for and proudly watched grow into a beautiful princess.

That is when I asked myself, "What does the Garden mean to me?" As the first director, what does this Garden symbolize to me personally? And I have concluded that to me, this Garden is a reminder of peace and reconciliation. A symbol that the City of Portland has the heart to forgive and accept foreign cultures. These are the virtues that this great nation was built upon.

At first, I was hesitant to tell this story. But I am 80 years old now. I feel it's my duty to be honest about what happened in the early 1960s. It was 1964 when I first came to this beautiful city of Portland with Professor Tono. And not too many people know that there was harsh opposition in the beginning. During the initial phase of the construction, hate groups gathered at the site, and chanted racial slurs at me. I was even hospitalized one time when I attempted to stop a group vandalizing the garden. When I confronted them, I quickly understood that this anger came from the war. I remember one man yelling, "you killed my father." That's when I realized that this Garden, to some, may have reminded them of their loved ones who were lost in the war.

And who can blame them? It had only been 20 years since that horrible war. Both sides lost precious families and loved ones in that war. And now, just because the government says so, we must be friends again? That is just too much to ask of a human. And now, we are building a Japanese garden on American soil? Of course there will be opposition.

However, as weeks turned into months, the sentiment started to shift. Little by little, people would support me and the Garden. They started to see and understand what I was trying to do here. The people of Portland found something in their hearts to forgive and accept; to let go of the anger and begin to reach out. I remember one time when the same hate mob came to the site, my supporters actually fought them off, protecting me and the Garden. For the first time in America, I didn't feel alone, I felt accepted by the people of Portland.

In 1967, we opened the Garden to the public. Slowly but steadily, visitors grew in numbers. They were so enthusiastic and would continually ask me questions about the Garden. But there is one visitor that I can't forget. She was an elderly woman supported by her daughter. She came to me and said in a beautiful voice, "Thank you." And she teared. Maybe I'm wrong, maybe I'm thinking too much. But as she walked away with her daughter, I felt that she had gone through so much pain. And I'd like to think something about the Garden gave her some peace of mind.

Now that I look back on those times, I can't help but be amazed at how Americans were able to overcome their past and reach out to their once enemy and accept their culture. This is what makes this country so great: willingness to accept other cultures. And not too many countries can do that. This is what makes this nation so unique.

However, the world is strange today. We are starting to isolate ourselves once again and looking for enemies. I can't help but feel that we are starting to forget our mistakes in the past; the lessons our ancestors taught us with their lives. How much we endured just to learn how to live with each other on this earth.

So let this Garden be a reminder to us all. A reminder how the people of Portland had the courage to forgive and accept the culture of the once enemy. This Garden is a monument of peace and a message to the world that, to borrow Hillary Clinton's words, "This great nation, does not build walls, but builds bridges!" Just some notes I had to get off my chest.

Connecting to the Garden through Tea

Look around the Portland Japanese Garden and it seems that tea is everywhere — the tea ceremony demonstrations, the Hosokawa Morihiro Art in the Garden exhibition, and the tea garden itself. Why does the Garden focus so much on tea?

The culture of tea gives insight into not just the Garden but more broadly the Japanese view of nature. Humankind is an intrinsic part of nature, not separate from or in opposition to it. As Sōshitsu Sen XV said in *Tea Life, Tea Mind*, "Closing my eyes, I find green mountains and pure water within my own heart. Silently sitting alone and drinking tea, I feel these become a part of me."

The practice of tea ceremony is referred to as *chadō*: the Way of Tea, telling us that tea is not just a drink: it's an aesthetic, a spiritual practice, a mindset, a way of living. Tea offers a place of sanctuary from worldly concerns. The host and guest spend time over a bowl of matcha, with the host displaying deep consideration towards the guest, who responds in gratitude.

The tea garden itself represents the Way of Tea's ideals of humbleness, austere beauty, and serenity. Passing through it on the way to the teahouse evokes feelings of traveling to a hermit's retreat in a distant mountain landscape, away from worldly concerns. The irregular path leads the visitor to focus on each step while pausing to breathe in carefully-framed views of stone, moss, bamboo, and plants. Every element of tea ceremony reflects this understated, austere beauty.

The philosophy behind *chadō*:

The underlying philosophy of tea evolved from Zen Buddhism. Sen no Rikyu, the founder of the Urasenke school of Japanese tea ceremony, articulated the four principles of tea as the following:

Wa - 和 (Harmony)

At a tea gathering, harmony plays between host and guest, guest and guest, mood, and season. Sensitivity to the changing seasons, and harmony with these changes are part of the practice of tea.

Kei - 敬 (Respect)

Respect is extended not only to the other people with whom one interacts but also to one's daily life, and even to inanimate objects such as tea utensils.

Sei - 清 (Purity)

Cleanliness and orderliness are important: entry to the teahouse is preceded by ritual cleansing at a stone basin and even cleaning floors is part of the process.

Jaku - 寂 (Tranquility)

As all the above show, the Way of Tea is a beautiful vehicle through

which to learn about Japanese gardens. It also emulates the ideals and values the Garden wishes to share: beauty, the restorative power of Tyler Quinn nature, attention to detail, and consideration for one another.

The Japanese Garden Training Center

Garden designer Gertrude Jekyll once noted that a garden is a marvelous teacher because "it teaches patience and careful watchfulness, it teaches industry and thrift, and above all it teaches entire trust."

Every moment spent in the Garden can be a learning experience — whether it's a spontaneous observation of beauty during a solitary stroll, a guided tour with one of our volunteers, or a hands-on workshop with a master. This year brings a wealth of new opportunities for learning in the Garden: along with the new expansion comes the launch of the Japanese Garden Training Center. The Center's mission is to teach the traditional skills and techniques for creating and caring for Japanese gardens while also acquainting students with the heart and soul of the art form.

The Center (formerly the International Institute of Japanese Arts & Culture) offers public lectures, one and two-day workshops in Japanese garden arts, and other short programs aimed at the general public, with new programs gradually being introduced. The Center's flagship is the *Waza to Kokoro* (Hands and Heart) training program. This certificate program of three 12-day seminars offers a rich and immersive educational experience with history lectures, a design module, garden and tool clinics, a master class and a hands-on workshop.

Application is open and only a few spaces are left for this year's seminar, "Waza to Kokoro — Hands and Heart: The Use of Stone in the Japanese Tea Garden." The seminar, August 25 - September 5, is designed for professionals in Japanese gardens but is also open to students and professionals in the landscape-related disciplines. Through a variety of learning tools, students will learn about authentic, locally-adapted design, construction and maintenance solutions for Japanese gardens. The seminar's guest speaker is author and landscape architect Marc P. Keane and the instructors include garden artisans from Ueyakato Landscape Co. in Kyoto and the Garden Society of Japan, as well as Portland Japanese Garden staff.



The Center's upcoming public lectures include landscape architect Ron Herman, who comes on Sunday, June 18 to give a talk contrasting the imperial gardens of Kyoto and Paris. Herman – with more than 400 designs to his name – has observed and documented Japanese gardens over the course of the last five decades. His formidable knowledge and passion, along with a collection of garden photographs collected over decades, promise an evening rich in images and original ideas.

In celebration of the Grand Opening of the Cultural Crossing expansion project, Art in the Garden is honored to present a glimpse into the creative life and work of former Prime Minister Hosokawa Morihiro, the 18th generation head of the Hosokawa clan of samurai, who left a career in politics behind and retired at the age of 60 to Futoan, his family estate in Yugawara, a small coastal hot-springs town in Kanagawa south of Tokyo.

Retreating from public life, he pursued instead the quiet life of an artist, studying Zen, practicing his own style of tea ceremony, and apprenticing with master potter Tsujimura Shiro—ultimately creating beautifully understated ceramic tea wares, rustic sculpture, lacquered bamboo tea scoops, painted fusuma screens, and poetic inscriptions in calligraphy.

With 600 years of family history as warriors, tea masters, calligraphers, and poets behind him, this modest Renaissance man spent a year and a half reinventing his life starting with a year-and-a-half traditional apprenticeship with renowned Nara potter Tsujimura Shiro. Today Hosokawa practices the art of life—tending his vegetable garden, writing Zen inscriptions in calligraphy, and spending time in his studio where he makes the simple ceramic tea bowls, jars and rustic Buddhist sculptures that express an inner life of modesty and compassion, far removed from the battlefield of modern politics.

"I find making pottery is a bit like Zen meditation. My mind concentrates on the task at hand, although I can't say I become completely detached from everyday life. When working with forces that have always existed, like clay and fire, I feel reduced to something insignificant, and yet completely at ease with myself."

His inheritance of the samurai's respect for Bunbu-Ryodo, the Twofold Path of Pen and Sword, reveals itself subtly in his expressions, for example that "being cultured means being sympathetic" and "modesty is the virtue of all virtues." Reflecting the spirit of Zen Buddhism and of Bushido, the warrior's code of honor, he embraces the simple art of life with ideals that have meaning for us today, beyond borders and time.

ONE EXHIBITION, TWO LOCATIONS THROUGH MAY 21

The Way of Tea plays a primary role in the cultural programs of the Portland Japanese Garden and we are honored to have former Prime Minister Hosokawa's first major solo exhibition in the US to open the new Cultural Village in both the Pavilion Gallery and the Tanabe Gallery.

As the first Art in the Garden exhibition in the new facilities, Hosokawa Morihiro: The Art of Life, A Rebirth in Clay is on view in both the Pavilion Gallery and the new Tanabe Gallery, located in the Jordan Schnitzer Japanese Arts Learning Center.

IN THE PAVILION GALLERY

The exhibition in the Pavilion includes a variety of ceramic tea wares and bamboo tea scoops (chashaku), as well as sculptural objects, such as Buddhist figures, pagoda, and lion dogs. A portable teahouse anchors the installation in the Pavilion, and features a display of tea utensils in place to provide a context for his work.

IN THE TANABE GALLERY

A celebration of the seasonality is on view in the Tanabe Gallery with seven seasonal pairings of calligraphy scrolls and ceramics that evoke subtle changes in the seasons as they are observed in the Way of Tea.


Tea presentations will be conducted in the Yanai Classroom and the Cathy Rudd Cultural Corner at various times through May 21.
