# Looking Toward the Future

Restoring the View from Portland Japanese Garden Looking east toward Mt. Hood on the steps of Portland Japanese Garden's Pavilion, you may have noticed that the iconic view of Portland's city skyline has been harder to enjoy. Since Portland Japanese Garden was first established more than 55 years ago, the trees and surrounding vegetation has flourished, hiding Mt. Hood in its foliage.

A group of dedicated advocates, the Garden Resource Committee (GRC), has been working for several years to establish and maintain this panoramic view, while also being good stewards of the environment. The GRC is comprised of board members, Portland Japanese Garden staff, and friends of the Garden.

The process began when GRC member and Garden Curator, Sadafumi Uchiyama, realized the view to Mt. Hood would be gone in the future, unless it was protected. "The view looking east from the pavilion is one of the most iconic views in the city, one the original Garden designer, Professor Tono, valued highly. It needed to be defined, protected, and preserved," said Uchiyama.

The City of Portland's Bureau of Planning and Sustainability (BPS) evaluated zoning and revisited previously protected views from the 1990's as a part of the 2035 Central City Plan development. After an extensive process involving community and GRC testimony to City Council in support of protection for the Garden's Mt. Hood view, and final state approval of the 2035 Plan, the view corridor from PJG is now officially protected. Work to clear the view will begin this year.

## Garden Happenings

As the plants wake up from their winter sleep, our gardeners are getting ready to welcome spring and a new year of growth. To encourage a lively scene, there will be a mix of projects on a large and small scale. Projects include:

- Pruning trees and scrubs to allow buds enough space to grow
- Planting around 200 trillium (native to the Pacific Northwest), along the Antique Gate and Entry Garden path
- Replacing and fixing bamboo fences throughout the Garden
- Regrading the grounds
- Starting the multi-year process of site mapping as a cohesive tool to better care for the Garden and its structural integrity for future generations

# Gateway to Explore the Natural World Haiku Alive Outreach Program

When longtime Haiku Alive classroom volunteer, Judy Voth, first worked with Penny Nuno's students, she just couldn't believe how quickly the second graders at Parkrose's Sacramento Elementary School absorbed the poetic form and made it their own.

"When we assisted them in putting their haikus together, I could see how far they had come in such a short time," Voth said. "It is very fulfilling for me, as a former teacher, to see how these connections have been made for students in the second grade!"

Portland Japanese Garden's Haiku Alive program, now in its ninth academic year with more than a thousand children participating to date, weaves together the magic trifecta of poetry, photography, and the value of living in harmony with nature. Haiku Alive offers literacy, visual creativity, and a sense of calm and harmony with the environment to underserved elementary students. The program serves students at the four elementary schools of Parkrose School District—a community home to more than 68 languages—as well as students with dyslexia at Park Academy.

"Learning about the Japanese garden makes me feel calm and confident. I also want to care about the environment," said Chris, a fifth grader at Prescott School.

"Many students in my class have serious issues beyond the classroom," said Jody Tucker, a teacher at Shaver Elementary School. "Nature calms them. Art engages them. Students look forward to Haiku Alive and the Japanese garden."

Any educator or parent can participate in Haiku Alive, through the program's new and free online curriculum, including a teaching guide, a set of presentations, worksheets, and guidelines for how to experience Portland Japanese Garden with children. # *The Brush of Shoko Kanazawa* Communicating Peace Through Calligraphy



Renowned for her artistry with brush and ink, Shoko Kanazawa (b. 1985) is one of Japan's most acclaimed contemporary calligraphers. Born with Down syndrome, Kanazawa began studying calligraphy at the age of five. Her affinity for this artform that requires mastery of the most subtle variations in line, placement, and saturation flourished as she grew up. Her first exhibition of work, fifteen years after she began, was a breakout success that set her on the path toward international acclaim.

Today, she is a leading proponent of performance calligraphy, which is driving a resurgence in popularity of the artform with younger generations. Her use of oversized brushes and *sumi* ink require full-body expressions and movement to create dramatic, large-scale works. In honor of her artistic achievements, Kanazawa has been named one of the official artists of the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

To symbolize her hopes for the world in 2020, Kanazawa selected the kanji character  $\pi l$  *wa*, meaning peace or harmony, as her personal statement. For a year which commemorates the 75th anniversary of the end of World War II, as well as the beginning of the new Japanese era of Reiwa (令和, or beautiful harmony) with the accession of a new Emperor, Kanazawa's message is particularly timely.

Kanazawa's way of viewing the world through her challenges, rather than despite them, imbues every calligraphic line with the openheartedness, empathy, and compassion she hopes to communicate and inspire in viewers around the world. Kanazawa spreads an inspirational message of peace and harmony that transcends borders and limitations of all sorts.

In honor of Kanazawa's visit, Portland Japanese Garden has partnered with the Northwest Down Syndrome Association to connect with the local community through special programming. These include artist demonstrations at the Garden and student outreach at Grant High School, which is Portland Public School's Japanese immersion school.

A Life-Giving Occasion: Nezu Gate Dedication

In honor of Koichi and Mihoko Nezu, the original entry gate to our historic gardens will receive an official name in April. The "Nezu Gate" will attain a specially commissioned plaque made by one of the most prominent carpentry firms in Kyoto, Nakamura Sotoji Komuten, with Shoko Kanazawa's skilled rendering of the gate's Japanese title, Nezu Gate (*Nezumon*, 根津門). This life-giving occasion of an otherwise inanimate object commemorates the indelible impact of the Nezu family to Portland Japanese Garden. Their strong emotional connection to the Garden and to Portland dates back 100 years when a Japanese delegation, led by Koichi's grandfather, Kaichiro, visited the city in 1905 for the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition. # Preserving Nature Through Art

The Interplay Between Water and Ourselves





For the first time ever, Portland Japanese Garden is establishing an artist in residency program in 2020 to provide unique opportunities for world-class artists to work with the natural beauty of the Garden and collaborate with its gardners, creating a truly special experience. By connecting art with nature, Portland Japanese Garden allows new perspectives, enhancing and enriching the way visitors see and experience the Garden.

Rui Sasaki, contemporary artist and educator in the field of glass making will exhibit her art, *Water Patterns* (September 19 - November 11) in the fall. Sasaki has already spent several days this winter at Portland Japanese Garden exploring and collecting plant samples to use in her exhibition.

Building on her life-long fascination of the structure and appearance of water, Sasaki will focus on making specially commissioned art using the Garden and its diverse plants as inspiration and medium to create glass art here in Portland at the Bullseye Glass studio in Southeast Portland. Her work will be exhibited through installations that respond directly to the Garden's lush setting, emphasizing the interconnected relationship of water and nature.

Sasaki will be back in Portland in early April and will hold an open studio experience at Bullseye Glass on Sunday, April 5. For more information on this event, please refer to the events page on our website.

Rui Sasaki will be the second artist in residency at Portland Japanese Garden this year. Our first artist in residence, Takahiro Iwasaki, will be in Portland throughout the month of May in preparation for his exhibition *Constructed Worlds* opening May 30.

## Connecting to Nature and One Another Meet the Garden's New Director of Development

Meet Edwina Kane, new Director of Development at Portland Japanese Garden. Starting at the Garden just last month, Edwina has already hit the ground running. She comes to Portland with a diverse background, serving most recently as Director of External Affairs for the International Documentary Association (IDA), in Los Angeles, California.

Prior to that, Edwina spent several years as Vice President of External Affairs for the Museum of Latin American Art (Long Beach, CA). She spent six years as the Director of Development and External Affairs at the Des Moines Art Center, (Des Moines, IA) and was the Director of Development for the Contemporary Art Center, (Cincinnati, OH). She has worked as a nonprofit consultant and provided fundraising mentorship for Southeast Asian documentarians at the Busan International Film Festival (BIFF) in South Korea.

Edwina holds a Bachelor of Arts in Art History from Dartmouth College in Hanover, New Hampshire and has received multiple certifications for organizational leadership throughout her career.
