
Rui Sasaki at the Portland Japanese Garden

My reason for my visit was to see Rui Sasaki's exhibition Subtle Intimacy: Here and There. While the Garden wasn't too busy that day, there were a lot of people there to see Rui Sasaki's art, which is currently exhibited in four different locations in the Garden. I was there for about an hour, which gave me time to speak to some visitors from the East Coast and a group of five guys from San Diego, California. They were all very impressed with both the gardens and the exhibit. The staff on hand that day were all friendly and professional people. They really take care of their visitors and are knowledgeable about the Garden and exhibits.

Rui Sasaki is a Japanese artist whose chosen medium, glass, has a real beauty and natural transparency. A major part of Sasaki's practice involves sandwiching plants between sheets of glass, which she then bakes to melt and bind the sheets together. To make these works, she often selects different leaves, ferns, and tree limbs, many of which are native to Japan, and for this particular show, she chose some of the flora from the Portland Japanese Garden. Every work is a unique, beautiful object, and I think that some are for sale in this exhibit. Rui Sasaki's exhibit is inspiring and make above wonderful souvenirs to take home as well.

Rui Sasaki is also a university teacher and has participated in numerous artist-
